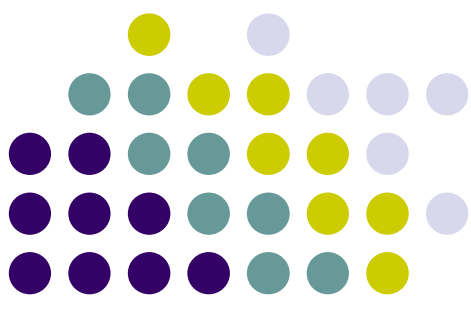

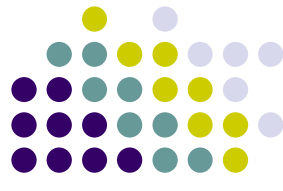

Penalty Enforcement – What are the most common technical fouls?



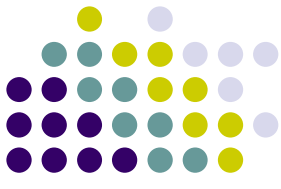
- Pushing – if a player lands on his face...he was probably pushed from behind
- Holding – was player disadvantaged when going to goal or attempting to scoop a loose ball?
- Illegal screen – Player setting pick must be stationary
- Crease violations – Remember the goaltender privilege and where ball will restart on violation
- Offsides – always count forward as you are running up field as the trail

What are the most common personal fouls?

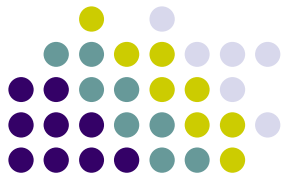


- Slashing – Contact is supposed to be stick on stick. Hands on stick – contact is allowed but official must watch how defender is using his stick (violent, uncontrolled swings). Blows to arms, head and back are obvious and must be called.
- Illegal body check – Official must call hits to the head or hits with the head (spearing).
- Unnecessary roughness – Watch the late hits or “take out checks” when defender lines up player from several yards away. Trail official must protect shooter or defender on clear.

Penalty Enforcement – How much time is appropriate?

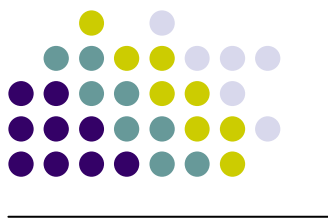


- Personal fouls can be 1, 2 or 3 minutes.
- Depends on severity of the foul.
- What appears to be a technical foul push from behind, if hard enough, can be a personal foul for illegal body check or unnecessary roughness.
- Never use term, “intent to injure” to a coach.
- Remember which fouls you can lock in & which ones you can’t (spearing, unsportsmanlike conduct and illegal equipment are non-releasable).
- A wise man once asked, “What does it take to get 2 minutes, a broken arm?...3 minutes...death?”



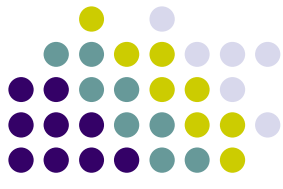
Penalty Relay

- **COLOR** – point toward bench as you are saying the color
- **NUMBER** – number of the player who committed foul
- **PENALTY** – what the infraction was
- **TIME** – how much penalty time
- **USE THE PROPER SEQUENCE!!!**



Penalty Relay (continued)

- Trail official **ALWAYS** relays penalty to table area.
- Head coaches must both be aware of what is going on so they can properly substitute.
- Stand at midfield when giving signals and make sure table area knows what is going on.
- Communicate with partner so he knows what the call is.
- Give good, clear signals.



Restarts – where and how.

- Must communicate with partner.
- Must communicate with players (goalie should absolutely know where ball is restarting).
- Restarts should be quick to keep game flowing but also must be safe and not disadvantage any players.
- **USE THE BEEPER WHEN APPLICABLE**



End line out of bounds restart

- Award the ball where it went out. One of only two times you will start ball in attack box.
- Time out after shot goes out of bounds – start ball exactly where it went out in attack box.
- If ball goes out toward corner of box, make sure you don't let player restart right behind goal.
- Give player with ball 5 yard space from defender.



Sideline out of bounds restart

- Know your responsibilities – who's got the restart and who is watching the substitutions/counting players on the field.
- Both officials should have both hands in the air – but don't run like this...move to your position and then put hands up.
- Hands in air is a **STOP** sign – don't blow through it.
- Use the beeper.
- Restart as soon as subs are completed. Official not restarting play points direction the ball is going to give official restarting play indication he is ready.
- Restart near substitution area – move in 5 yards from sideline.



Restart after goal

- Lead gets ball out of net.
- Trail watches front of cage.
- Ball is exchanged and both officials **JOG** to their positions.
- Official not conducting face-off puts beeper on. Will count players and signal partner that they are ready. Face-off official is watching his partner for signal.

Restart after loose ball technical foul



- Make sure player who was fouled has 5 yard cushion all around.
- Make sure he is not trapped near sideline.
- Restart should be quick, but safe.
- No running starts.
- Don't disadvantage the player with the ball.

Substitutions – what are you looking for?



- Substitution violations – remember...A1 must be completely off field before A2 can enter field.
- Offsides – did player enter field of play on proper side of field?
- Player interfering with another player coming off the field. Players in box must yield to player exiting the field.



How to officiate substitution area

- Pause as the trail official.
- If going by the box – hug the sideline and pause to watch the subs. Lead has counts until you get into play.
- If on far sideline, pause at the cone and watch the box. Violation has to be obvious to make a call from here.
- In settled situation, back up toward sideline and blade body open to watch subs while keeping field in front of you. **NEVER** turn your back to the field and players.
- Double check before you make the call – it's OK to call it late – just make sure you get it right.
- Check substitution area for players before you make a call.
- Keep substitution area clear as you pass box. Make coaches clean up the box.
